**Prof. Dr. Maximilian Spraul:
Why is it so difficult to prevent diabetic foot ulcers?**



Professor Spraul is one of the leading physicians of the Interdisciplinary Diabetic Foot Centre at Mathias Spital in Rheine, Germany. He is a specialist in internal medicine and diabetology and also a member of the guideline committee for diabetic foot syndrome at the German Diabetes Association.

Diabetic foot ulcers may lead to infections and in the worst case to amputations, which emphasises how important it is to avoid them. In his lecture Professor Spraul will discuss the difficulties involved in the prevention of diabetic foot ulcers.

**Prof. Dr. Rolf Daniels:
Foam creams – an innovative formulation concept for effective diabetic skin care**



Professor Daniels is a pharmacist who specialises in pharmaceutical technology. His work group at the Institute of Pharmaceutical Technology in Tübingen, Germany, investigates emulsion technology. One of his areas of expertise is the field of foam creams and he is a member of several committees that focus on pharmaceutical, technological and dermatological issues.

Developing products with high-level compliance is a major challenge in the provision of support for patients in their daily skin care. In his lecture Professor Daniels will emphasise that foam creams are not only very effective, but are also more suitable for high-level patient compliance and convenience.

**Prof. Dr. Dr. Ehrhardt Proksch:
Skin problems of diabetics – a challenge**



Professor Proksch, medical specialist in dermatology and a chemist, is deputy director and chief consultant at the dermatology department of University Hospital in Kiel, Germany. He is engaged in research into wound healing, atopic eczema, the permeability barrier, skin infections, skin care and skin protection.

It is very important for diabetics to avoid skin lesions on their feet as a diabetic's skin has distinctive features. In his lecture Professor Proksch will point out the special skin problems experienced by diabetics and will provide an insight from a dermatologist's perspective into why these problems are a special challenge for both patients and physicians.

**Prof. Dr. Thomas Haak:
Foam creams: acceptance and effectivity in a daily life setting**



Professor Haak specialises in internal medicine, endocrinology and diabetology and is head of the Bad Mergentheim Diabetes Centre in Germany. He has considerable experience in Phase II-III clinical studies on growth hormones, insulin analogues, antihypertensive drugs and oral antidiabetics, for example, as principal investigator and co-investigator.

Professor Haak will speak about his experiences in using a foam cream at his hospital in a daily life setting.

**Prof. Jan Apelqvist MD, PhD:
Diabetic foot therapy, what to expect in the coming years**



The chairman of this symposium is Professor Apelqvist. He is a specialist in internal medicine, senior consultant at the University Hospital of Malmö, Department of Endocrinology, and associate professor in the Department of Clinical Sciences at the University of Lund in Sweden. The management of diabetes, multi-organ disease and diabetes-related complications are at the centre of his interest.

Many of Professor Apelqvist's publications deal with diabetic foot ulcers and the treatment and prevention of diabetic foot problems. In his lecture he will present a highly interesting outlook on possibilities and expectations for diabetic foot therapy in the coming years.
